


# Annual Report 2019-20



# THE COLORADO SPRINGS CONSERVATORY NAVIGATES THE PANDEMIC AND FLOURISHES

Fiscal Year 2019-2020, was a unique year for Colorado Springs Conservatory (CSC) characterized by growth and expansion fueled by creative initiatives in response to an unforeseen challenge.

CSC remained flexible and adaptive throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, and reframed the crisis as an opportunity to extend its reach through addition platforms of program delivery. For example, CSC expanded access through the Community Partnership for Childhood Development (CPCD) parent portal to include weekly live online classes for Early Head Start and Head Start student which served over 1,800 families. In addition, thirteen episodes of the Simple Gift Series, an early childhood television program, were created and began airing in August 2020 on Rocky Mountain PBS (RMPBS) for children across the state to enjoy learning music and early literacy skills.

As CSC reopened its doors to return to onsite programming, it worked diligently to follow safety precautions and restrictions set forth by the CDC and the state of Colorado. CSC leadership ensured that staff was aware of all current protocols and regulations as they continuously charged and evolved. New cleaning measures were put in place as were protocols for class size, social distancing, and mask wearing for all staff. Due to these guidelines, room usage was reconfigured throughout the Conservatory to maximize the experience of the students allowed in each space.

CSC recognized the potential of the long-term effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, on individuals as well as institutions, and began working on a third platform of program delivery via Zoom, YouTube and television with RMBPS. A fourth platform, mobile programming to bring in person arts immersion into neighborhoods and rural communities, is in its initial planning phase. With the addition of these platforms, CSC will become even more versatile in its ability to respond to the needs of its partners, students, and community. Expansion of programs and outreach abound for CSC, and it anticipates being presented with even more opportunities in the coming year. CSC has tripled its reach over from serving 1,000 students to serving over 3,500 students and families in the past twelve months.

CSC also recognized the importance of social emotional wellbeing, particularly on the youth, and saw the that social distancing, school closures, and other measures put in place for public health reasons could lead to a sense of isolation. Providing a creative outlet to allow the youth to process the feelings and experiences they have endured throughout the pandemic was paramount in the eyes of CSC, and it was able to provide support through its unique and various program platforms.

# **Important Highlights**

CSC revised and enhanced their early childhood development curriculum into the *Early Childhood Music & Literacy PICCOLO* program for children birth through 48 months.

- This program emphasizes learning and development as well as the importance of the role of the parent/caregiver.
- Each section of the PICCOLO program consists of curriculum designed specifically to development in the areas of motor, language, cognitive, and social emotional.



In a partnership with Centennial Elementary School made possible by a grant through the Denver Foundation, *Transforming Safety initiative*, CSC has gathered further supportive data. Through this grant, CSC is further strengthening its role in its ability to

• reduce high risk behaviors, increase protective factors, and build resiliency as well as support social equity and justice for these youth.



This partnership has made arts immersion programming available to all 511 students at CES. Data suggests that participation in this program elicits

 increased self-confidence, peer support, teamwork, empathy, ability to handle new/different situations (i.e. new skill acquisition and demonstration), and managing difficult emotions well (i.e. vulnerability, embarrassment, shyness).



Feedback from parent surveys further supports these outcomes in that these students have

 begun forming healthy bonds with peers and adult mentors, are experiencing increased self-esteem or selfworth, improving coping skills, setting higher goals for themselves, improving time management skills, have increased positive work ethic, improved communication skills, and have learned skills that they can use in other areas of their life.





Through the development of additional platforms, CSC has been able to expand their outreach *from* 1,000 to served to access for 3,500 students and families.
